#### echo Submission Policy

The following describes the policy guidelines regarding articles/photos/graphics submitted for publication in the echo. Submissions which do not adhere to these guidelines may, at the sole discretion of the Editor be returned to the submitter or omitted from publication.

#### echo Deadline Date

Submissions are due to the Editor at btecho@etcmail.com by 4 p.m. on or before the seventh of each month prior to the publication month. Submissions sent to any other email address will not be considered.

#### Articles

All articles must be submitted via email, 12 pt. Times New Roman font, double spaced in MS Word (or similar) format. Please use built-in double spacing options instead of typing extra returns at the end of each line. We have to go through and manually remove them. Any article received not double spaced will be returned to submitter for correction. All articles must include the author's name. A contact phone number must be included in the email.

#### **Photos**

Do not send embedded photos. Submissions including embedded photos will be returned to the submitter for correction. Most modern equipment has settings you can adjust in the image quality menu to medium or high size. We suggest you set your camera to the highest image quality setting. Note that photos that are attractive online may not be of high enough quality for print. If a photo is not of adequate size for print, it will be omitted. Include with your photo a suggested caption including names of any people in the photo, left to right. Use of stock photography is discouraged, except where it is the only option available. It is the sole responsibility of the submitter to obtain any photo release(s) which may be required.

#### **Photo Locations**

When wanting a photo to appear in a specific location of an article, merely write insert 'golfeventpic JDoe 1 here' with appropriately named photo. See Naming Files section.

#### **Naming Files**

Multiple files included in a single submission should have corresponding filenames. For example, photos submitted with the article should be named in the following manner - (Name of photo to match title of article, capitalized first letter of first name, followed by capitalized first letter of last name, with the remainder of the last name of the photographer, followed by number of photo.) For example, an article named golfevent.doc that has two accompanying photos would be named golfeventpic JDoe1.jpg, golfeventpic JDoe2.jpg

#### **Captions**

Captions should be written at the bottom of the article and should reference their corresponding photos. For example, golfeventpic JDoe 1 - John Doe at a tournament.

#### Accuracy

It is the sole responsibility of the author to ensure accuracy of all information included in any article or event promotional material submitted for publication in the echo. Articles shall reflect correct spelling, punctuation, and grammar. Any submission with other than a minor amount of correction required may, at the sole discretion of the Editor be rejected.

As we entered March of 2022, it was time for a mediocre UNC team to conclude their regular season by visiting Duke for Coach






higher ranked. Still, I didn't want UNC to be the final highlight of Coach K's career...or did I?

## Ladies 18 Holers News

Of all sports, golf has the most unusual set of rules, such as knowing the differences between yellow stakes, red stakes or white, and many golfers grow confused on what the USGA rules of golf truly are. On our travels this summer, my husband, Brian, and I came across a set of "rule changes for seniors" at a golf course in Michigan.

#### Rule Changes in Effect for Senior Golfers age 70+:

**Rule 1.a.5** – A ball sliced or hooked into the Rough shall be lifted and placed on the Fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into the Rough with no penalty. The senior player should not be penalized for tall grass which groundkeepers failed to mow.

Rule 2.d.6(B) – A ball hitting a tree shall be deemed NOT to have hit the tree. This is simply bad luck and luck has no place in a scientific game. The senior player must estimate the distance the ball would have traveled if it had not hit the tree and play the ball from there.

Rule 3.b.3(G) – There shall be no such thing as a lost ball. The missing ball is on or near the course and will eventually be found and pocketed by someone else, thereby making it a stolen ball. The senior player is not to compound the felony by charging himself with a penalty.

**Rule 4.c.7(H)** – If a putt passes over a hole without dropping, it is deemed to have dropped. The Law of Gravity supersedes the Rules of Golf.

Rule 5.e.4(U) – Putts that stop close enough to the cup that they could be blown in, may be blown in. This does not apply to balls more than three inches from the Hole. No one wants to make a mockery of the game.

Rule 6.a.9(K) – There is no penalty for so-called "out of bounds". If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior player deserves an apology, not a penalty.

**Rule 7.g.15(Z)** – There is no penalty for a ball in a water hazard, as golf balls should float. Senior players should not be penalized for any shortcomings of the manufacturers.

Rule 8.k.9(S) – Advertisements claim that golf scores can be improved by purchasing new golf equipment. Since this is financially impractical for many senior players, one-half stroke per hole may be subtracted for using old equipment.

Rule 9.k.34(A) – If a tree is between the ball and the hole, and the tree is deemed to be younger than the player, then the ball can be moved without penalty. This is so because this is simply a question of timing, when the player was younger, the tree was not there so the player is being penalized because of his age.

#### Golf is ...above all ... a game of integrity.

To learn the real USGA rules of golf, ask our golf professional, Patrick Higgins, or better yet, come join one of our golf associations – MGA, Ladies 9 holers, or the Ladies 18 holers. The season starts this month, so check in the Pro Shop for more info. There's no better way to learn the game, improve your score, and make new Bent Tree friends.

When is this fun community event? Saturday April 13 from 10AM to 1PM

#### Who do we need to work?

Volunteers who are willing and able. In fact, grab your friends or come alone, we will be here. And you can come for one hour or all four. That is your choice. We need all adults and teens who are willing to get dirty, have camaraderie and a sense of accomplishment for contributing to this worthy safety event.

#### What are we doing?

Using leaf blowers to clean the loft (se we need a blower brigade). This is the first task. Must be able to climb to loft and competently use a power blower. These volunteers should be there by 9:45.



## Big Adventures – In the Saddle Again

Since the 1800s, the allure of the west has never waned. There's a romanticism attached to the big open spaces, the beauty, and the blue skies go on forever. Add horseback riding to that landscape and now you have rugged and romantic. Out west--the ideal location to take a vacation, and that's just what resident Bob Crowl did.

In fact, Bob and friends spent six nights at a ranch. This was the sixth dude ranch vacation that Bob has enjoyed.

In August, Bob and friends headed to the Western Pleasure Guest Ranch in Sandpoint, Idaho, which encompasses 2500 acres in the narrow northern part of the state, just south of the Canadian border. Bob said August was the ideal time because the weather was warm and sunny during the day and cooler at night, with the days still long enough to do a lot of outdoor activities.

While there was a main lodge at the ranch, where meals and some evening gatherings took place, he stayed in his own cabin, equipped with a kitchen, living room, bedroom, bath and a loft.

According to Bob, a typical day began with a hearty breakfast and then four to six hours in the saddle, not necessarily a straight six hours. Bob said if he were to change anything about this ranch, it would be to offer more time on the horse. There were other activities in addition to riding hat guests could choose to participate such as archery, clay pigeon shooting and e-biking.

Any level rider can vacation at the ranch, but Bob cautions the novice. If you haven't spent a lot of time on a horse, you may want to put some more miles in a saddle before going to a dude ranch. Bob has been riding for about 30 years and considers himself an intermediate rider. Once you arrive at the ranch, guests are assessed and then matched with a horse. Bob's horse was a Percheron (draft) and Quarter horse blend, who stood over 16 hands. Bob said he and his friend Susan were extremely well matched to their mounts, which of course made the experience enjoyable.

When it was time to hit the trails, the twenty guests were divided into two or three smaller groups. Guests were not obligated to go on every ride, so if someone wanted to opt out, they could. In addition

to the trail rides, there were a couple of scenic rides in open meadow areas. If you wanted to learn the ways of cowboys and cattle ranchers, that was available too.

Bob worked on his ranching skills such as herding cattle where he and others had to go and find the cattle in the woods and bring them back to the holding area. Bob also worked on sorting cows, which is where the rancher must isolate a cow, for various reasons. There was a competition amongst the guests for the sorting and Bob and his team finished first and were awarded a blue ribbon. (Go Bob!) He also participated in a roundup. Bob shared that all the ranching tasks look much easier than they actually are because it takes precision, finesse, patience and lots of animal cooperation.

Some of the highlights were having dinner outside under the stars at the lodge while watching a movie, and riding to Grouse Creek Falls to have lunch beside the river just below the waterfall where it was both majestic and peaceful.


Bob would definitely go back to this ranch, and he said of all the ranches he has been to thus far, this one had the best food!







## January Hiking

As always, when a Bent Tree group hike is scheduled on a certain date, you never know what the weather will be. In the hiking world, the co-leader of a hike is said to be responsible for the weather (LOL) but this month, three hikes were scheduled without a co-leader so I hoped for the best. My thought was that after the holiday season and during the dreary winter weather, a walk on a trail would be a welcome change whatever the weather conditions were. Little did I know that we would gain so much more than that.

The first hike on Thursday, January 11 up to Sharptop Mountain happened on a beautiful sunny cool day that felt like fall. Nine adventurous hikers, four of which were newbies to hiking Sharptop, began at the water tank at the top of SouthView Trail inside Bent Tree. We made our way up the road to the trailhead and began hiking the trail. Upon reaching the top of Sharptop Mountain, we enjoyed full sunshine, clear and distant views of Pickens County, Kennesaw Mountain, and even the skyline of Atlanta. The trail itself provided a good cardio and leg workout due to it's steep, rocky terrain. We returned to our starting point after completing over 3 miles and about 1000' elevation gain.

A full description and maps of the following three trails are included in the new 2024 Bent Tree Community Directory prepared by Bent Tree Activities Committee volunteers.

The second hike on Thursday, January 18 consisted of Bent Tree's Beaver Run Trail and the Denny Ridge Trail. Again the weather that day provided us with an amazingly beautiful day after having several days of freezing temperatures earlier in the week. Four hikers covered the Beaver Run trail enjoying the rapid water flow in the creek. Next hiking the second trail up on Denny Ridge was beautiful with it's icicle show in the creek and in several places. We even got an upper body workout using the new rope handrail system that was installed by our Bent Tree Trail Maintainer, Mason Holland and crew. We covered nearly two miles of trail that day, enjoying many natural water features.

The third hike had to be rescheduled for Monday January 29 after several inches of rain fell on the original hike date. A carpool of ten hikers parked in the nice new area constructed by the Johnson family and L&W volunteers. There we entered on donated land into the Chestnut Cove Trail System through the Dorough trailhead to the sounds of running water below provided by the recent rains.



We descended into this area on the Creekside Trail stopping on the rock face overlooking all of the many creeks that were flowing beautifully down the mountainsides. After the group crossed three high flowing creeks using rocks to navigate, the end of this trail was reached where a great view of a sliding rock waterfall was enjoyed. Next the hike turned up the High Vista Trail just over the first rise to see the upper part of the sliding rock creek. A return trip along the main trail by the creek traveled back over the three creeks including a hardy ascent back up to the parking area. This one mile green space trek was full of beauty and gifted each one with a feeling of accomplishment and great joy in experiencing this wonderful natural area.

The month of January may not bring you to the thought of hiking but I assure you that hiking in January will bring you much more than you expect. The benefit of cool winter hiking in nature with long range views could be restorative and stress relieving, bringing improved sleep, and lengthening and improving the quality of your life.

Due to many volunteers and their hours of hard work and the donated gifts of Bent Tree residents to the community, we can find information about a Bent Tree trail, park at a trailhead, access a trail, hike and climb on a dirt path and explore the wonders of nature without having to travel afar.

But the biggest benefit of group hiking in the Bent Tree community area could be the joy of a walk with neighbors, together in nature, sharing gratitude for the opportunity of living in this beautiful place we love to call home.

## Celtic Fire at Big Canoe Chapel – Music in the Mountains

Celtic Fire will perform at Big Canoe Chapel as the second concert in the concert series, "Music in the Mountains." **This free concert is 4 pm, Sunday March 3, 2024 at Big Canoe Chapel, 226 Wolfscratch Village Circle, Big Canoe GA.** Under the direction of Music Director Dr. Samuel Holmes, the concerts are organized by Dr. Calvert Johnson, Keyboard Accompanist at the Chapel. Persons from outside Big Canoe will need to inform the gatekeepers that they are attending these concerts in order to enter Big Canoe.

The Celtic harp and uilleann pipes are Ireland's two indigenous instruments, though the fascinating history of each is quite distinct. The Celtic Fire trio weaves the two together with Irish step-dance, penny whistle and bodhran (Irish frame drum) into a program that culminates with a crowd-pleasing ceili (music and dance party), featuring audience participants who are taught simple dance steps and accompaniment on harp and bodhran (hand-drum). Celtic Fire was a featured program of Young Audiences of Atlanta for over 15 years. During that time they performed and taught literally thousands of Georgia school children in assemblies large and small. Celtic Fire also offers a concert program suitable for all ages.

Nella Rigell, John Maschinot and Mary Hughes will present a fascinating program of traditional Irish music and dance. Though the musical combination of harp and bagpipes may seem unconventional, Nella and John have refined their sound through decades of performance together. John's uilleann pipes (also called Irish bagpipes) offer a much mellower tone than the famed Scottish Highland bagpipes and blends beautifully with Nella's Celtic harp. Brilliant young step dancer Mary Hughes provides percussive footwork sure to make for a unique program of soulful airs and toetapping dance music!



Nella Rigell's illustrious career spans both the realms of classical and Celtic harp. As the principal harpist of the Atlanta Ballet Orchestra and a fixture in touring Broadway productions, she has lent her talents to numerous recordings, television, and radio performances. Her artistry has garnered praise from critics and audiences alike. Described as possessing "expressive delivery and superior technique" and hailed for

her "remarkable regard for tonal beauty" by The Huntsville Times (Ala), Nella is recognized as "one of Atlanta's busiest and most sought-after harpists", according to Music Atlanta. The Mississippi Business Journal also lauds her "ability to captivate large chamber concert audiences."

Beyond her professional engagements, Nella finds deep fulfillment in using music as a therapeutic tool. At Emory Hospital, she shares the soothing sounds of the Celtic harp, offering relaxation and comfort to patients.

Nella Rigell's multifaceted career also includes a role as an educator, where she has shared her expertise in Celtic harp at the renowned John C. Campbell Folk School. Through her teaching, she imparts the intricacies of this ancient instrument, inspiring students to delve into the rich tapestry of Celtic music and culture. As a soloist,

Nella has had remarkable opportunities to showcase her talent. She premiered Laura Zaerr's Celtic Harp Concerto with the DeKalb Symphony Orchestra, later reprising the piece with the Atlanta Chamber Players. In a poignant tribute to the late harper, Derek Bell, Nella joined the esteemed Irish ensemble, the Chieftains, earning acclaim from Jig Time International for her "moving performance."

Collaborating with fellow musician John Maschinot, Nella explores her passion for Celtic music, delighting audiences across Georgia with their diverse repertoire. Their performances blend traditional Irish, Scottish, and Welsh tunes with classical inspirations, creating a truly eclectic experience.



John Maschinot has been playing uilleann pipes, Irish flute and tin whistle for nearly four decades. The uilleann pipes, or Irish bagpipes, are a type of bagpipe possessing a beautiful tone, much quieter than the more familiar Scottish Highland bagpipes, and therefore highly suited for indoor performance. John's performance and recording career spans almost four decades, both solo and in ensemble with The Buddy O'Reilly Band, Celtic Fire, The

Kinnigans, Ah Surely, Mythology, and as guest musician with many other artists. He produced and directed Atlanta's Celtic Christmas from 1990 to 2019.

John's playing is grounded in a piping tradition of the past 300 years. John is an ardent student of the time-honored Irish piping tradition but often goes further to explore a larger musical territory, reflective of his life experience and love of all sorts of music. Growing up in southern communities rich in musical tradition, John thrives on the diversity that American music has to offer. Old-time string band music, bluegrass and Appalachian melodies, African-American spirituals, the blues, and perhaps a Cajun two-step: John has devoted much of his career to the study and performance of non-Irish music on his distinctly Irish instruments.

## Discovering Bent Tree Diversity through Citizen Science

The mountains and valleys of Bent Tree can differ greatly in their plant and animal life. By the running mountain streams in the valley there are woodland salamanders and frogs, water snakes, water birds, and distinctive kingfishers with their rattle. The water loving Citronella Horse Balm which can be smelled a foot away! In higher elevations we typically find larger wildlife like the American Black Bear. Plants have a more rocky, sometimes shallow soil to make their home in, but many native plants thrive here. Fields of Bear's Foot, in the sunflower family and also known as hairy leafcup, grow and thrive in the harsher conditions.

Lake and Wildlife programs are good gatherings of neighbors who want to learn about the wide wild world just outside our doors. In between the Saturday meetings and volunteer events, here are some new ways to continue learning and connecting.

Seek is a free cell phone application that will take your nature knowledge up a level by helping you identify plant and critter species that you encounter. All Seek observations are



kept on your own phone. If you choose, your observations can be uploaded to iNaturalist and shared with others. 'Bent Tree Diversity' is an iNaturalist project that collects observations made within the general Bent Tree geography by those who choose to participate. The goal is to document and learn about the variety of species found in Bent Tree. In Habitat Conservation terms, this is a chance for Citizen Science of the most fun sort! Like humans always have, we learn best about the natural world by getting outside and experiencing, discovering, and following our curiosity. We can share with each other interesting discoveries made in our back yards, on roadside walks, adventurous hikes, and fun fishing outings. Sharing observations helps us all know what native plant families are thriving and can be useful in developing plans to preserve Bent Tree habitat. But even if you aren't ready

to participate in the Bent Tree project, consider using Seek for your own learning and enjoyment.

Another great organization using technology to help encourage habitat conservation is Homegrown National Park started by Doug Tallamy, author of Natures Best Hope and The Nature of Oaks. The largest cooperative conservation project ever conceived or attempted, its initial goal is 20 million acres of native plantings in the U.S. (Note that only represents approximately ONE HALF of the green lawns of privately-owned properties). The map estimates/tracks the total area occupied by native plantings and is a way for individuals to see their part in the whole. Add your plantings to the HNP Biodiversity Map to light up our area. Your entries do not have to be exact; they are estimates of the native plants and the area they cover. Whether planted by you or pre-existing on your property, add them to the Homegrown National Park. Lake & Wildlife Habitat Conservation will be providing updates as Bent Tree lights up in the Homegrown National Park!

In a recent offering of our Echo Monthly magazine, there was an article about Road Safety Awareness, a very much appreciated and welcome communication regarding one of the most important issues in our community.

Road Safety Awareness evolves from important to critical when the road is the only means of conveyance for all (service vehicles, private vehicles, ATVs, golf carts, unmotorized vehicles and, yes, pedestrians), as is the case in our community.

There are several elements influencing Road Safety; key among them are:

Speed Limit. In the same edition of the Echo Magazine mentioned above, it was reported there were 49 citations and 12 warnings issued by Public Safety in December 2023; those represent the ones who were caught. One can easily surmise that, for everyone caught, there may be hundreds who were not. We, both drivers and enforcers, can do better!

Playing by the rules. According to Georgia law, "...pedestrian shall yield the right of way to all vehicles upon the roadway unless he has already, an under safe conditions, entered the roadway." Since we do not have sidewalks, as soon as we as pedestrians leave our driveways, we have entered the roadway.

Common Courtesy. We all share the road, and that includes all types of vehicles, pedestrians, and wildlife; no one has priority (except emergency vehicles under emergency circumstances). As pedestrians we have the responsibility to always make ourselves visible; we must ensure that we don't make it harder than it already is for drivers on our challenging roads. As drivers we must realize that the road is shared, and that our actions could cause serious harm to those with whom we share the road. We, both drivers and pedestrians, must do better!
