Did you know that the backroom at the Tavern used to be the Bent Tree Library? And did you know, the patio area off the Tavern was once screened in? These are just a few things I learned in my interview with Taree Darby, Director of Marketing and Community Services for BTCI.

Taree enjoys laying low and leading a quiet life. She has a small social circle with an intensely fierce group of friends. One of her favorite traditions is the long-standing Sunday dinner with her family. Taree was born in Atlanta, and around age 10, her family moved to Bent Tree. In 2018, she became a property owner.

As a child, her parents successfully operated several local restaurants. In the late 90s, they ran the 19th Hole as independent contractors. Thus, she grew up as a restaurant kiddo with an appetite for food and management. In her twenties, she moved to California and started with Panera Bread. Since people are her passion, it was a natural transition into a corporate role with Panera. She honed her skills as a regional training manager. Additionally, she trained all sorts of staff, from top chefs to menu creators, conducted seed training to test new food technology, and served as the test gauge for success. Furthermore, she audited local restaurants and, in 2014, was awarded the first Platinum Audit in Atlanta. She takes pride in training restaurants for operational excellence.

After over a decade in restaurant management, Taree left the field in 2018. She dabbled in wineries before moving into a human resources role. She later became the Executive Director of the Georgia Wine Producers before accepting her position at Bent Tree. Her previous experience gave her the skillset for taking over community services, which includes all the amenities within Bent Tree.

Taree gained the confidence of the Board of Directors and was given a "Hail Mary" attempt at running The Tavern. There has been a change in the culture of The Tavern with an urgency placed on accountability and operational excellence. Employee scheduling will be based on sales reports. And finally, costs will be managed by accurate margins using metrics to make sound decisions.

My impression of Taree is that she is a respectful, thoughtful, and articulate leader. She strives for obtainable and measurable goals and thus has raised the bar at The Tavern. She has collaborated with our Food and Beverage employees to help them achieve and set a higher standard of service, which our community appreciates. We are blessed to have her on our Bent Tree leadership team.

Bent Tree Seniors "Rock"







Severe Weather Preparation

Recent severe weather highlighted the need for all residents to prepare for major weather incidents. Strong storms can devastate our community without warning. It is imperative for everyone to maintain a state of readiness for these incidents by taking some basic storm preparedness actions and ensuring they are receiving vital communications from Bent Tree staff.

Email Alerts are our primary method of communication with Bent Tree residents. They cover any information of significance to our community, including the Friday News. Everyone should be signed up for these alerts. Email your name, address, and contact information to Michael Koorey at michaelkoorey@bent-tree.com if you are not receiving these. Information contained in Public Safety email alerts is generally also posted on the Bent Tree Public Safety Facebook page. We recommend all residents search Facebook for Bent Tree Public Safety and follow us.

The Bent Tree Infoline can be reached at 770-893-2999. This line includes prerecorded messages that are kept current during events or incidents with major community impact. The Infoline does not always reflect the information relayed in email alerts. However, during major weather events in particular, Public Safety will keep the Infoline updated in case residents are experiencing an internet outage. Please call this line to find out about road closures or spillway status instead of the front gate. Public Safety recommends checking the Infoline frequently during major weather incidents.

Our text alert system is generally used to deliver high priority messages during major community events or incidents. Messages will often direct residents to other platforms, such as the BT Infoline. There are certain limitations with text alerts, so they are not used often. Email your name, address, and contact information to Michael Koorey at michaelkoorey@bent-tree.com if you would like to receive Bent Tree text alerts or believe you are not receiving them.

Pickens County CODE RED Alerts come directly from Pickens County Emergency Management and deliver valuable emergency information via recorded messages to your phones. We encourage all residents to sign up for these alerts in the Public Safety section of the Bent Tree website.

An extended power outage resulting from severe weather is the most likely emergency our community faces. There are some basic things that all Bent Tree residents can do to be ready.

Public safety recommends having at least one gallon of water per person, per day, for seven days for drinking and sanitation. Most residents have generators for backup power. Having a backup water supply is even more important and much simpler. There are many good inexpensive options available for storing water including cases of bottled water, gallon jugs or larger, heavy duty polyurethane water storage containers, and large water tanks which store up to five hundred gallons. These are just some simple options to consider. Reasonably priced gravity filtration units are also available. Some of these filtration units have the capability to purify very contaminated water. Public Safety recommends researching and doing what is best for your situation and storage capabilities of your home. Whatever option you choose, make sure to fill containers before weather events or other emergencies take place. Filling your storage containers after power is lost to the water plant will result in you and your neighbor being without water service.

Public Safety recommends having at least seven days of nonperishable food as well. Large amounts of storable food that last twenty years or more are available at various online and local retailers. Considering inflation and supply chain shortages, having a supply of long-lasting storable food is simply a wise investment in your household's well-being and security. Don't forget to store extra pet food as well.

Think about items that you use daily, and make sure to have several days of them stored for emergency situations. Commonly used items include medications, vitamins, toilet paper, tissues, paper towels, and cleaning supplies. Some suggestions for very useful emergency supplies are batteries, flashlights, battery-powered lanterns, hand warmers, blankets, butane stoves, and portable power stations. Additional suggestions can be found through links in the Public Safety Emergency Preparedness section of the Bent Tree website.

Having a generator is a must within Bent Tree. Some generators are set up to turn on automatically when power is lost and can support everything in a home. Others must be started or connected manually and are meant to only power some important appliances. Either way, generators are extremely valuable machines capable of preserving your ability to power medical supplies, heat and cool your home, cook, and refrigerate or freeze food.

Purchasing a generator is more complicated than storing food or water. Depending on how you prefer it to be set up, an electrician or generator specialist may need to be consulted. It is important to always follow all safety guidelines in the owner's manual and perform the recommended maintenance. Some vital questions to answer when purchasing a generator are as follows:

- Will the generator be fueled by propane or gasoline? Although gasoline powered generators typically cost less, there are many advantages to a propane generator that need to be researched. Either way, an adequate fuel supply is a necessity.
- Where will the generator be stored and kept while in use? It is very important to understand that emissions produced by generators are very dangerous. Because of that, they cannot safely be used indoors or within enclosures. Make sure to follow all manufacturer's guidelines regarding placement and all other safety related items.
- How powerful of a generator is needed? There are various "wattage reference guides" available online that display estimates of power used by common appliances. It is worth noting that the necessary power to start an appliance is generally much higher than the normal running power requirement. Please consider which appliances you want to power and their total "starting power requirement" when deciding which generator meets your needs.

Do not allow your propane levels to fall too low. Have your tanks filled regularly, so that you will always have an adequate supply. Bear in mind that if you wait until a weather event is forecasted to have you tank filled, propane companies will be much busier fulfilling orders for others who also waited.

If your power goes out, call Amicalola EMC at 706-253-0359 to report the outage immediately. Only after you have properly reported it should you notify Public Safety, so we can be aware of possible downed trees. Also, please do not tie up our phone lines asking for updates on power restoration. We will put out updates via our communication channels only once reliable information is obtained. The best way to check the status of your power outage is to do an online search for "Amicalola EMC Outage Map". Follow the link to a map that shows all outages and their status. You can even see if a crew is assigned to your outage or on scene. The current link to the outage map on 7/26/24 is https://outages.amicalolaemc.com:83/. However, the link does sometimes change.

It is very important to minimize driving during strong storms. Severe weather frequently brings down trees and power lines. Your chances of contacting one of these hazards go up significantly if you drive during or immediately after a storm. Do not drive or walk near a downed power line. Downed power lines present both visible and hidden hazards. These lines can be energized even if they don't hum or spark, and even downed power lines that appear dead can become reenergized at any moment. Downed lines can also energize other objects, such as the ground or nearby puddles, utility poles, vehicles, fences, trees or foliage, ladders, and siding. Report downed power lines to Public Safety at 770-893-2628.

Wintry weather poses its own challenges and can quickly cause our roads to become impassable for most vehicles. Please plan ahead to ensure you do not get stranded away from home during winter weather events. During these incidents, Public Safety limits its travels to emergency responses only. We will do our best to monitor road conditions and keep residents informed via email alerts and the Bent Tree Infoline.

This information is intended to help residents be selfsufficient and in a position that allows them to ride out a multiday weather event comfortably at home. Do not allow yourself to be in an ill-prepared position that pressures you to make dangerous decisions. If after reading this, you realize your preparations are inadequate, please do not wait to act. Once a weather event begins, it is too late to prepare. We hope this information is useful and helps all Bent Tree residents to be prepared for the next major storm.
