

We have heard you loud and clear that you are thrilled with the recent dues DECREASE and we are so happy to have finally been able to put this goal into action!

#### **KEY UPDATES:**

**NEW!** We have just renegotiated a 2-year rate with Cycle Works for the neighborhood. Cycle Works will provide (1) 95-gallon trash can for \$16 per month and residents who wish to recycle may add on (1) 95-gallon recycling cart for an additional \$6 per month. This rate requires monthly payment via autodraft. If you are a current Cycle Works customer, you must call in to have your rate lowered. See information below:

#### DUES UPDATE

#### ANNUAL ASSESSMENTS:

Your \$1000 annual HOA assessment is due February 1, 2025. The Board approved the option to split the payment in two equal payments of \$500 due February 1, and \$500 due May 1, 2025. Overdue accounts are subject to 18% per annum interest charges.

In addition to avoiding late interest charges, the other benefit to making sure your account is current is to ensure you have access to the pool and other amenities. Your keycard is subject to suspension if your account is overdue.

#### **Protecting Your Pets During Bird Flu Season**

Bird flu, or avian influenza, has recently been a concern in Georgia, with cases detected in both commercial and backyard flocks. While the virus primarily affects birds, it's essential for pet owners to take precautions to ensure their furry and feathered companions stay safe.

#### **Bird Flu in Georgia: What We Know**

In January 2025, the Georgia Department of Agriculture confirmed cases of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in both a commercial poultry operation in Elbert County and a backyard flock in Clayton County. These detections prompted statewide measures, including a temporary suspension of poultry shows and sales and the establishment of quarantines around affected areas. The virus poses a serious threat to Georgia's poultry industry, but it can also impact pets if they come into contact with infected birds or contaminated environments.

#### How to Keep Your Pets Safe

- Limit Exposure to Wild Birds
  - Avoid letting pets roam in areas where they might encounter wild birds, especially near water sources like ponds or wooded parks.
- Secure Backyard Spaces
  - Remove bird feeders and birdbaths temporarily to minimize contact with wild birds.
  - Monitor your pets outdoors to ensure they don't approach dead or sick birds.
- Practice Good Hygiene
  - Wash your hands thoroughly after handling your pet, especially if they've been outside.
  - Clean pet bowls and toys regularly to prevent potential contamination.
- Know the Signs of Illness
  - Symptoms of bird flu in pets include coughing, sneezing, lethargy, and difficulty breathing. Contact your veterinarian immediately if you notice these signs.
- Stay Informed
  - Follow local news and public health updates about bird flu in your area.


#### What to Do if You Find a Sick or Dead Bird

If you come across a dead or visibly ill bird, do not let your pet investigate. Report the sighting to the **Georgia Avian Influenza Hotline at (770) 766-6850** or contact your local animal control. These organizations can handle the situation safely and assess whether the bird may be infected with avian influenza.

By staying vigilant and informed, you can help protect your pets and our community from the effects of bird flu. While the risk to pets is relatively low, taking precautions ensures the health and safety of everyone—human, feathered, and furry alike.

#### Rediscover the Wonder (cont'd)



What can we do to address this issue? I don't want to create bad blood with my neighbors, but this has become a real problem.

#### Dear Worried,

Well, howdy-ho, neighbor! Let me start by saying that dogs are a wonderful part of any neighborhood like living, tail-wagging sunshine. But when a pooch becomes a peril, it can certainly throw a shadow over that warm, fuzzy feeling.

First off, it's important to remember that while your HOA can tackle many things—like paint colors and mailbox uniformity (or, ahem...lack thereof)—dogs and their behavior fall outside its leash, so to speak. That means the best course of action is to reach out to Cherokee County Animal Control. They're equipped to handle situations involving aggressive or nuisance animals and can assess the situation fairly and professionally.

Before making that call, though, it's a neighborly gesture to try a friendly conversation with the dog's owner—if it feels safe to do so. Sometimes folks don't realize their pup's behavior is causing concern, and a little communication can go a long way. Approach them with kindness and understanding—like a plate of warm cookies instead of a cold stare.

If that doesn't work or you're not comfortable approaching them, animal control is your next step. They can step in to ensure everyone—two-legged and four-legged alike—stays safe.

Now, neighbor, I know it's not always easy to take action in situations like this, but protecting your family and ensuring a peaceful neighborhood is worth the effort. And who knows? With the right intervention, maybe that barking buddy can turn back into a tail-wagging delight.

Remember, when it comes to barking up the right tree, kindness and action are the keys to harmony.

## DIY Valentine's Heart Wreath

Add a handmade touch of love to your door this Valentine's Day with this easy-to-make heart wreath!

#### WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Wire heart frame (available at craft stores or online)
- Red, pink, or white felt (about ½ yard each)
- Fabric scissors
- Hot glue gun
- Ribbon for hanging

#### **OPTIONAL:**

Faux flowers, mini hearts, or other embellishments

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Prepare the Felt Pieces
- 2. Cut the felt into small strips or squares, roughly 2 x 2 inches. These will be the "ruffles" for your wreath.
- 3. Attach the Felt to the Frame
- 4. Fold a felt piece in half, then in half again to form a small ruffle.
- 5. Use a dab of hot glue to secure the folded felt onto the wire frame.
- 6. Repeat this process, working your way around the frame and overlapping pieces for a full, fluffy look. Alternate colors for a fun pattern, or stick with one color for a bold statement.
- 7. Add Embellishments (Optional)
- 8. Glue on faux flowers, mini heart cutouts, or sparkly accents to add personality to your wreath.
- 9. Attach the Ribbon
- 10. Tie a ribbon to the top of the frame for hanging. Choose a coordinating color for a polished look.
- 11. Hang and Enjoy!

Find the perfect spot to display your new wreath and enjoy the festive Valentine's vibes!

#### ARCHITECTURAL APPROVAL

Your Woodmont HOA appreciates the hard work and dedication that homeowners provide to make their homes and properties beautiful. We want to keep the community looking its best and keep property values at their highest!

Here are a few questions that have been asked recently. If you have a question or need additional information, please contact woodmont@ sixesmanagement.com.

#### WHY DO I NEED HOA ARCHITECTURAL APPROVAL FOR MY SHED WHEN IT'S IN MY OWN BACKYARD AND NO ONE WILL SEE IT?

It can be difficult for owners to understand the importance of submitting requests for approval, especially when what they want to do is on their own property. They may feel that following a community's standards restricts their freedom of expression. The reality is, property values are protected when homeowners follow standards which have been carefully developed to create uniformity and a nice balance for the community.

#### WHAT TYPES OF EXTERIOR MODIFICATIONS REQUIRE HOA APPROVAL?

Any architectural change to the outside of the home or the property surrounding the home requires approval. Exterior modifications requiring approval include things as swimming pools, decks, sheds, new siding or shutters, paint color changes, windows and doors, patios or patio extensions, fences, landscaping with fire pits and retaining walls, play sets and basketball goals, and the removal of live trees.

#### HOW DO I KNOW IF MY PROJECT NEEDS APPROVAL?

Everything you need to know here is contained in Section VI of the Declaration of Protective Covenants for Woodmont Golf And Country Club document, available within the documents section under the communication tab at hoawoodmont.com. If you have any question or uncertainty, please contact woodmont@sixesmanagement. com. to ask first whether or not your project requires approval.

#### WHAT HAPPENS IF AN OWNER MODIFIES THEIR PROPERTY WITHOUT APPROVAL?

Some owners simply ignore the process, don't know an approval is required, or fail to read

the request. In some cases, an unapproved structure may have to be removed or altered. The property manager and Board are eager to work with homeowners to come into compliance with the least amount of escalation. We encourage you to work proactively with the property manager as you plan for property modifications.

#### WHAT SHOULD OWNERS SUBMIT FOR HOA ARCHITECTURAL APPROVAL?

Owners should submit the Request for Modification (RFM) form along with a drawing or rendering of what the change will look like and include a copy of their property survey (which should be included with their closing paperwork). The project should be marked in red (with measurements) on the property survey. Written details along with

pictures and samples of materials are also required. Complete

instructions are listed on the RFM form.

#### HOW SOON AFTER APPROVAL SHOULD THE WORK BEGIN?

Work on any approved modification must commence within 30 days of the written approval from the Board of Directors or the approval will automatically lapse and be revoked. Owners may reapply for approval of a proposed modification by submitting a new RFM form.

#### APPROVALS AND DENIALS

The majority of architectural requests are approved, even if slight modifications or conditions are necessary. If an application is denied, the homeowner is provided with specific details as to why the request was denied.

their governing documents. Failing to obtain approval will result in violation letters being sent. The Board will request that the owner immediately submit for approval so that the owner, any future owner, and all committee members are protected

by assuring that the proper process for property modifications was followed. Once submitted, the Board will either approve or deny the modification. For unapproved modifications, the Board may require the homeowner to restore their property to its original condition based upon the review of

#### **COMMUNITY COVENANTS** & RESTRICTIONS

To preserve property values and keep Woodmont as a community of choice, the exterior upkeep of common areas and individual homes is a top priority. To that end, the community is regularly monitored for any occurrence of violations of community covenants and restrictions. Below is a list of common violations which will help you remain aware and maintain compliance of your own property. Full documentation of all covenants may be found at hoawoodmont.com.

#### **COMMON VIOLATIONS**

The list below is not inclusive but captures some of the more common violations/issues:

- Clotheslines, garbage cans, woodpiles, and other similar items must be screened from view of neighboring Lots and street
- Basketball placement (standard is backboard perpendicular to street)
- Artificial plants in containers or window boxes are not permitted

- Yard art, unrelated to celebrated holidays must be approved
- Exterior painting and/or pressure washing must be maintained
- Mailboxes must be compliant and maintained
- Landscape beds are to be maintained, free of weeds and mulched according to guidelines
- Private pools exceeding thirty-six (36) square feet located above ground are not allowed (children's wading pools, that can be emptied at night and not left out are permitted)


#### MAILBOX REPLACEMENT

Replace your mailbox if it is damaged, in need of repair in anyway, or not standard USPS height. According to the USPS, your box should be between 41 and 45 inches tall. The authorized dealer for Woodmont is Addresses of Distinction, 770-436-6198.

#### **REQUEST FOR MODIFICATIONS (RFM)**

The Architectural Standards Guidelines can be

found at hoawoodmont. com. You may submit a request online



or download the Application for Approval of Exterior Modification form from the Sixes Management Group portal (sixes.cincwebaxis.com). If you have any questions regarding whether or not your intended project is an exception to this requirement, please email woodmont@sixesmanagement.com.. This important step could save you time and money!

TIP: To avoid delay in processing your RFM, make sure to include a copy of your Plat (showing lot lines, house placement and easements) with your planned modification outlined in red. If you did not receive a plat at closing, you may find instructions on obtaining an online Cherokee County site map for use in lieu of plat under the documents section of hoawoodmont.com. The document is titled "RFM Site Map Instructions.
